EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT IN THE SYRIAN AND ROHINGYA REFUGEE **RESPONSE REGIONS**

Early childhood development (ECD) programming, although critical for human development and learning, has overlooked beyond the basics of food, shelter and survival in humanitarian contexts.

Professor Hiro Yoshikawa and Dr. Alice Wuermli report on current and planned research in initiatives to provide and evaluate ECD services in regions with Syrian and Rohingya refugee flows - which are currently two of the largest flows in the world. This research represents partnerships between Sesame Workshop, the International Rescue Committee, BRAC, and (as the research and evaluation partner) NYU's Global TIES for Children Center.
