

## 19th Annual Yale National Education Alliance for Borderline Personality Disorder Conference

### **Destigmatizing BPD**

#### May 10, 2024, 9:00am-5:30pm

**OVERVIEW:** The conference is aimed at mental health professionals, training clinicians, and researchers, as well as those with lived BPD experience and their family members. Our presenters include researchers, treatment developers, master clinicians, and individuals with lived experience of BPD. These presenters will make research and practice accessible to both professional and lay audience members, and ample time will be provided for questions from the audience throughout the conference day. The conference theme for the 19th Annual Conference, scheduled for May 10th, 2024, is Destigmatizing BPD. Five professional presenters and two lived experience speakers will discuss stigma, labeling, and their relationship to loneliness and social alienation, how stigma's inherent invalidation contributes to the disorder, the unique ways it can affect members of the LGBTQ community, and how stigma can and must be addressed and minimized. Our hope is that this conference will contribute to better understanding, support, and assistance for individuals suffering from emotional dysregulation, and decrease stigma for them and their families.

This year's Yale-NEABPD conference events will feature a one-day hybrid conference on 5/10/2024 and all focused on themes related to decreasing stigma in borderline personality disorder.

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES:**

By the end of this course, participants will be able to:

- 1) To demonstrate the advantages of using a dimensional approach for the diagnosis of BPD specifically as it relates to destigmatization.
- 2) Explain the stigmatizing and invalidating processes by which sexual and gender minority populations may be at higher risk for BPD.
- 3) Explain how education interventions can reduce mental illness stigma.
- 4) Identify gaps in clinician education about BPD and describe research suggesting that clinician education reduces stigmatizing attitudes about BPD.
- 5) Describe the relationship between loneliness and emotion regulation in BPD.
