NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) is the third leading cause of death in the US and worldwide. Recent findings challenge traditional concepts in COPD pathogenesis, highlighting the role of lung development in disease trajectory and risk factors other than tobacco smoking. Understanding of COPD heterogeneity is developing, along with new treatment modalities, with implications for diagnosis as well as trait and endotype-specific therapies. There is a need for education regarding these advances and emerging trends in the field.
