Needs assessment: This course is needed due to the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic caused by the SARS-CoV-2 virus. COVID-19 is commonly associated with liver injury and coagulopathy, but the mechanism of these disease manifestations is poorly understood. This course will present new research that enhances our understanding of liver injury in COVID-19. Objectives: 1) Participants will gain an understanding of COVID-19-associated coagulopathy; 2) Participants will learn about new associations between clinical markers of coagulopathy and liver injury in COVID-19; 3) Participants will learn about the model of thromboinflammatory liver injury in COVID-19 supported by new in vitro data with primary human cells.
