Smilow Cancer Hospital Care Center in Old Saybrook

Effective August 11, Dr. Wajih Kidwai and Dr. Su Lim and Physician Assistants Melissa Gargano and Sarah Curtis, will no longer offer hematology/oncology services at the Smilow Cancer Hospital Care Center in Old Saybrook. The Smilow Cancer Network will consolidate our resources at our Smilow Cancer Hospital Care Center location in Guilford to provide comprehensive cancer services to our patients and their families.

Eye Protection

The PPE Advisory Group, which includes leaders from Infection Prevention, Yale Medicine, and clinical leadership of all hospitals and medical groups, has determined that eye protection is no longer universally required for all episodes of care.

- Eye protection must continue to be used in both ambulatory and inpatient settings if patients are in COVID-19 isolation, as part of Standard Precautions in situations where splash/spray with blood/body fluid may occur, or if handling a chemical or in a situation that requires the use of eye protection.
- Healthcare workers may voluntarily choose to wear eye protection at other times.


Flynn Fellows

Smilow Cancer Hospital and Greenwich Hospital are proud hosts of our 2022 Susan D. Flynn Oncology Nursing Fellows. This year, the nursing teams mentored Madeline Perrino, Catholic

University; Natalie Kennedy, Sacred Heart University; Lydia Grist Manrique, Sacred Heart University; Edna Yilma, Quinnipiac University; and Charlotte Hamilton, University of Connecticut. They completed rotations of clinical areas throughout Smilow and worked on evidenced-based research projects, including nursing implications for CAR T-Cell Therapy, potential complications following allogeneic transplant, breast flap reconstruction patient education, diversity in cancer care, and self-care and resiliency in the oncology nurse. Of the more than 200 Flynn Fellows who have graduated into the workforce to date, more than two-thirds have taken positions as oncology nurses and 46 are working in Connecticut hospitals.

Betsy is first and foremost an extraordinary clinician. She has been the warning beacon, safety-net, sounding board, and champion for our patients from her first day on service. Betsy has also had one of the highest levels of engagement in the division. She has never been one to accept the status quo. She is always ready and willing to offer a novel perspective and original potential solutions to some of the toughest challenges.
