This conference will address difficulties managing cognitive challenges that can complicate the lives and treatment of individuals with Borderline Personality Disorder such as dissociation, psychosis and intellectual impairments. The conference will address basic clinical research, neuroscience, psychopharmacology, psychotherapy, and consumer and family perspectives.

Course Objectives

- Become familiar with the Borderline Personality Disorder (BPD) diagnostic criteria and its associations with cognitive-perceptual difficulties including dissociation, psychotic states, and cognitive distortions.
- Summarize the effects and side effects of psychotropics, notably antipsychotics, in the treatment of BPD-related cognitive disturbances.
- Identify key areas of neuropsychological deficit in BPD and characterize the nature of these deficits and their associations with functional disability.
- Appreciate the challenges of struggling with cognitive challenges and/or borderline personality disorder based on first-hand consumer and family member accounts.
- Question observed cognitive irregularities (e.g., memory loss, apparently delusional thinking) that might overlap with and confound diagnoses.
- Become acquainted with an empirically supported program for family members of individuals with BPD.
- Describe evidence for a relationship between childhood trauma and the development of affect regulation and implications for effective clinical interventions.
- Recite several factors that increase and decrease cognitive load demands which are important when designing interventions for individuals with learning challenges.
- Learn the System Tools for individuals with learning challenges and be able to link skills in adaptive chains of behavior.
