This panel discussion will focus on raising awareness about the evolving dynamics of open access publishing of research funded by public or private research councils and funding agencies.

Increasing access to scholarly publications can allow interested researchers, patients, families, healthcare providers, and members of the public to follow the latest advances and address the most critical health concerns facing their communities. This panel aims to: 1) present an overview and key practices of open access publishing in global HIV-related fields, and 2) discuss the implications and opportunities for researchers and publishers.

Seth Kalichman, PhD
Editor-in-Chief, AIDS & Behavior
Professor, University of Connecticut

Professor Kalichman's research focuses on all aspects of the global AIDS pandemic. He devotes all of his research time to behavioral and social aspects of AIDS in the US and South Africa. His research is committed to developing and testing interventions to prevent the spread of HIV and assist people living with HIV to live long and healthy lives through increasing access to health care, improving retention to health care, and increasing life-long medication adherence. His other interests include health disparities and HIV/ AIDS behavior research.

### Kate Nyhan, MLS, IPI PMC

### Research and Education Librarian for Public Health, Yale University

Kate Nyhan is a research and education librarian for public health at Cushing/Whitney Medical Library and a lecturer in environmental health sciences at the Yale School of Public Health. She earned a post-master's certificate as an interprofessional informationist at Simmons University School of Library and Information Sciences. As an information expert, she contributes to evidence synthesis and meta-research projects. Her research interests include research waste, reproducibility, reporting, and the information behavior of the public health workforce.

### Luke Davis, MD, MS

## Associate Professor of Epidemiology (Microbial Diseases) and of Medicine (Pulmonary, Critical Care and Sleep Medicine), Yale School of Public Health, Yale School of Medicine

Luke Davis is a pulmonary and critical care physician and clinical epidemiologist using implementation science to find, treat, and prevent tuberculosis (TB) and HIV, two of the leading cause of death due to infection worldwide. He teaches and mentors students and directs a graduate program on implementation science at the Yale School of Public Health. He is also involved in several international research training programs focused on implementation science. He is a Yale Medicine physician, and attends in the Medical Intensive Care Unit and the Winchester TB Clinic at Yale-New Haven Hospital, caring for patients and their families and teaching medical students, residents, and fellows.

### Tracy Rabin, MD, MS

### Associate Professor of Medicine (General Medicine) and Clinical Professor of Nursing, Yale School of Medicine

Dr. Rabin is an Internist and Pediatrician who joined the Yale faculty in 2011 as a member of the Section of General Internal Medicine (YSM Department of Internal Medicine), and currently serves as the Director of the Office of Global Health, and the Associate Program Director for Global and Community Health in the Yale Primary Care Internal Medicine Residency Program (YPC). She attends and teaches on the medical wards at the St. Raphael's Campus (SRC) of Yale-New Haven Hospital; directs care and precepts residents in the SRC Adult Primary Care Diabetes Clinic; co-directs the YPC Community Engagement Curriculum; directs the YPC Home Visit Elective; and co-directs the Makerere University-Yale University (MUYU) medical education capacity building collaboration which is based at the Makerere University College of Health Sciences/Mulago National Referral & Teaching Hospital in Kampala, Uganda. Her areas of academic interest include global health education and clinical ethics, outpatient diabetes management, and health care transitions.
