NEEDS ASSESSMENT

The incidence of melanoma continues to rise annually: An estimated 192,310 new cases of melanoma (including melanoma in situ) will be diagnosed in the U.S. in 2019. Ultraviolet (UV) exposure is considered to be a major risk factor, but not all melanoma occur on sun exposed skin. It is thus important for dermatologists to understand potential risk factors of melanoma, prevent its development and recognize early melanoma.
