NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Chen- Changes in surgical education, mostly notably work hour restrictions, have required residents to spend less time on the operating room. Training programs must find new alternatives, such as simulation, to fill this void.

Glasgow- Importance of adequate initial treatment in the management of papillary thyroid cancer

Solomon- Knowledge among practitioners about synthetic blood substitutes for clinical application is limited. This talk attempts to educate providers about the state of the art in synthetic blood substitutes
