The Dorothy Horstmann Scholars Program is named for Dorothy M. Horstmann (1911-2001).



Dr. Dorothy M. Horstmann was a principal researcher of the pathogenesis and control of viral infections, particularly polio and rubella. Her findings helped develop the acceptance of the oral polio vaccine. In 1961, Dr. Horstmann became the first female professor of medicine at Yale, and in 1969, she was the first woman in the university to hold an endowed chair. Dr. Horstmann became an elected member of the National Academy of Sciences in 1975.
