This was probably one of my favorite seminars that we've had so far (though I may be biased since I love juvenile justice work). It was really nice to hear about Dr. Brown's story and the work she is doing. However, I think less time could have been spent on the juvenile justice system and its innerworkings. Instead, I would have loved more time with the case conceptualizations. I love opportunities to apply our perspective as psychologists to interactions with other systems and it was really fun to discuss the cases she was bringing.

The intro part was a bit lecture-heavy if it's possible to either shorten or incorporate more interaction in the first part.

It was unclear to me how to this session (aside from just providing new information) could be related to my practice as a clinical psychologist not in a justice setting or was related to my skill development on internship. It could be helpful to discuss the ways in which we might interface with the justice system in our various roles, discuss practical strategies to coordinate with the justice system or affiliated providers, etc.
