NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Sickle cell disease (SCD) is the most commonly inherited blood disorder. Though rare, patients affected by SCD may experience potentially visionthreatening retinopathy. The gaps in knowledge include the following: costefficient and high-yield sickle cell retinopathy screening paradigms, application of novel retinal imaging techniques to evaluate and longitudinally follow sickle cell retinopathy progression, and understanding of systemic factors associated with SCD that may be correlated with higher likelihood of vision loss.
