NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Changes are taking place rapidly across the healthcare landscape, and recent societal challenges – such as the COVID-19 pandemic and growing trauma caused by racial injustice – have exacerbated our nation's longstanding need for a more effective approach to mental health and substance use disorders. These challenges highlight the need for a fundamental shift in how we think about and address behavioral health. A population health perspective provides a framework to address many of the recent and historical challenges that we face. This presentation will describe why a population health approach is needed and what it looks like – both conceptually and practically. The talk will also specifically address long-standing health disparities and offer strategies to improve health equity. Moreover, the presentation will touch upon some of the implications that a population health paradigm has for the future of our scientific research and training.
