NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Long term outcomes for patients with benign and low-grade brain tumors are poorly understood and understudied and yet vital to maximize both quantity and quality of life, particularly as survival for these patients lengthens. Neurosurgeons caring for patients with these tumors should be aware of the latest research in their quality of life to understand mechanisms by which it can be improved.
