#### NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Delirium is an often-unrecognized complication of critical illness that affects a high percentage of ICU patients. Commonly used treatments are not often evidence based, but data from recent clinical trials and large quality improvement projects provide guidance regarding appropriate management of delirium.
