NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Fisher:

Transurethral resection of the prostate has been the gold standard for surgical management of benign prostatic hyperplasia for decades; however, over the past decade, photovaporization of the prostate with the GreenLight laser has become a viable alternative for the initial surgical management of this disease. I will present the evidence comparing these two therapeutic approaches and discuss the advantages and disadvantages to each.

Resident: The goal of this conference is review unusual and teaching cases. The conference is designed to review basic as well as rare cases. Cases are analyzed and in a case review format and then there is a teaching session to review all important clinic aspects of the case with group discussion.
