

Dr. Traci H Abraham earned her PhD in medical anthropology from the University of Connecticut. Her research at the VA focuses on adapting, implementing, and evaluating behavioral health interventions. She specializes in translating qualitative data into meaningful improvements to healthcare and using qualitative research to adapt behavioral health interventions to specific contexts and at-risk populations to increase access to patient-centered care. She is affiliated with the Center for Health Services Research and the Translational Research Institute at UAMS and is involved in efforts to expand institutional and community capacity to engage in community-based participatory research.
