NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Transplant center and medical centers generally are increasingly facing value-driven reimbursement for health care. Health outcomes commonly depend on health behaviors, such as medication adherence after transplant. Yet, most transplant staff have little education about how to assess and intervene on medication nonadherence or other important health behaviors. This study will fill this gap in knowledge among transplant staff by reviewing important new data about medication nonadherence and novel strategies to improve the problem.

1. The audience will learn about risk factors for medication adherence in transplantation.
2. The audience will learn about national trends related to monitoring patient health between visits and about tools to monitor medication adherence.
3. The audience will learn about potential strategies to improve medication adherence.
