NEEDS ASSESSMENT

While positive airway pressure (PAP) therapy remains the gold-standard for treatment of OSA, it is not always a feasible or tolerable option for all patients. Alternative therapy options are important in all facets of healthcare. Provent, is an Expiratory Positive Airway Pressure (EPAP) therapy device that provides an FDA approved alternative to OSA management. Understanding this treatment modality is a requisite for all clinical personnel involved in the management of OSA.
