This presentation will update the participants on recent data pertaining to changes in the heart function and circulatory system in patients with decompensated cirrhosis and their clinical impact. **Objectives:** 1) To review changes in the cardiac function in cirrhosis, as described in the recent literature; 2) To evaluate the characteristics of the circulatory system in patients with cirrhosis, and their clinical impact; 3) To draw light on controversial aspects of the present theories on the development of complications in cirrhosis. **Faculty Disclosures:** C Ripoll - None; Jakab - None.
