

Global Health Education Innovation Award

Amount: Up to \$10,000

Eligibility

The Global Health Education Innovation Award is designed to promote and support global health education work by YIGH-affiliated faculty around the globe, including the United States. Projects should address an important issue in global health education. Funded through a partnership of the Offices of Global Health Education (OGHE) at the Yale School of Medicine, the Yale School of Public Health (YSPH), and the Office of Global Affairs and Planetary Health at the Yale School of Nursing, the inaugural awards will be administered by the Yale Institute for Global Health (YIGH). Four awards, each up to \$10,000 will be issued, including:

- Two from OGHE at the Yale School of Medicine for projects that are led by YSM faculty and include a medical student.
- One from the Yale School of Public Health for a project that is led by a YSPH faculty member and includes a Yale undergraduate, graduate student, or trainee (resident, fellow, other health professional student).
- One from the Office of Global Affairs and Planetary Health is led by a faculty member at the Yale School of Nursing and includes a Yale undergraduate, graduate student, or trainee (resident, fellow, other health professional student).

Application Requirements

- Applicants must have a current Yale faculty appointment and be a YIGH Faculty Affiliate.
- Proposals are required to include at least one Yale student as specified above and may include other Yale faculty and trainees, as well as faculty and trainees from the domestic or international site.
- Proposals should include activities with foreseeable “real world” educational impacts and benefits.
- The project should utilize evidence-based education theory and curriculum design precepts.
- Proposal activities should be completed within two years of the award being granted and commence within the calendar year in which the grant is awarded.
- Applications should be written for reviewers without specialized expertise in the applicant’s field or discipline.

Application Materials

Proposals should be no longer than two pages (Part I and II), excluding project plan, budget, and letter of support (as applicable). The application should be organized in this format:

- Part I: Title and Project Abstract
- Part II: Background, Rationale, Potential Impact, and Evidence of Strengthening Institutional Collaboration



- Part III: Project Plan: Activities, Timeline and Expected Outcomes
- Part IV: Budget
- Part V: Letter of support from the proposed site (as applicable)

Review Process

- Complete applications received by the deadline will be reviewed by members of the YIGH Faculty Academic Review Committee independently and will include both quantitative and qualitative evaluation. Efforts will be made to avoid conflicts of interest (COI) in the review process.
- Applications submitted past the deadline will not be considered.
- All funding decisions are final.
